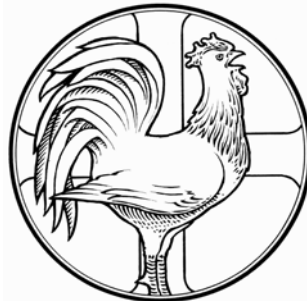
From the Pastors



Getting Rid of Guilt

"Then Peter remembered the word the Lord had spoken to him: 'Before the rooster crows today, you will disown me three times.' And he went outside and wept bitterly" (Luke 22:61, 62).

Dear Brothers and Sisters of our Lord Jesus Christ,



For our pastors' letter this month we share the following devotion written by Rev. Hal Senkbeil. It is taken from his book, Triumph at the Cross, pages 135-136. As you know we have been highlighting the importance of confession and absolution throughout this Lenten Season. Pastor Senkbeil focuses in on what confession and absolution accomplishes, namely, it gets rid of our guilt.

"And he went outside and wept bitterly." Those were no 'crocodile tears' Peter cried. Those were tears of a broken man – tears of remorse and shame.

That same Peter had been the first one to confess Jesus as the Son of the living God. In fact, that's how he had gotten his name. For that confession Jesus had given him the name Peter, which means 'the rock.' And a rock he had been. In Gethsemane he was the disciple who drew his sword to defend Jesus from capture by his enemies. 'Though they all fall away because of you,' Peter had boldly promised Jesus, 'I will never deny you.' And for that moment at least, he had been ready to back his words with actions.

But just a few hours later, Peter's bold claim crumbled. In the gray light of early dawn, Peter stood in the high priest's courtyard and, with cursing and with swearing, denied not only that he was a disciple, but that he had ever known Jesus. And just then the rooster crowed. Jesus turned and looked at Peter. And Peter remembered the words of Jesus: 'Before the rooster crows today, you will disown me three times.' And there in the night, this giant of faith, this great big rock of a man, broke down into tears.

Our interest in Peter is not merely historical. It is no casual curiosity that brings us to examine these events. For you and I *are like* Peter. We too have denied our Lord. Time and again we have turned our backs on him, and by our words and by our actions, we have denied ever knowing him. We *are* Pe-

ter. His need is our need. Therefore we come in this holy season of Lent for repentance. We come, in other words, for a change – a change so deep and so profound, a change so very real, it can only be called a new creation. We pray with the psalmist: 'Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me' (Psalm 51:10).

You see, if we claim that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God, who is faithful and just, will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. That's confession and absolution in action: a simple matter of truth. Telling the truth to God, we admit the bitter, awful truth of our sin. Hearing the truth from God, we learn that, as far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our sin from us. He placed them all on Jesus, who bore our sins with him into death, that he might absolve - that is, cleanse and forgive – everyone who trusts in him.

That's how we deal with guilt: the bitterness of sins confessed and the sweet truth of sins absolved and gone forever in Jesus' name. He places his forgiveness into the preaching of the gospel, into Holy Baptism, into the Lord's Supper, and into holy absolution. He takes our guilt and gives us his forgiveness, life, and salvation. And by grace through faith, we receive the peace of mind and heart that is the joy and peace of Christ himself!"

Trinity Lutheran School – Making Known the Love of Christ Bearing the Fruit of the Spirit

The fruit of the Spirit is ... **Faithfulness**. (Galatians 5:22,23)



Why is God faithful to me? Why does He continue to show steadfast love to me? Why does He keep his promises to love me and forgive me? He is faithful because He is love. On my own, I am truly a poor, miserable sinner. I have not been faithful to God. I have not loved the people around me with His love. At the beginning of our Divine Services, I hear these words: "But if we confess our sins, God, who is faithful and just, will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." I go on to confess my sins of thought, word, and deed, by what I have done and what I have left undone. I deserve God's punishment, yet I beg for mercy for the sake of Jesus Christ. The pastor then announces to me the joyous news that God has been merciful to me, Jesus has died for my sins, and Almighty God has forgiven all of my sins. God is faithful!

His faithfulness shows the depth of His love. This love of Christ has been made known at Trinity for its 157 years. But this message had its beginning in the Garden of Eden. The students of our school are taught that, in spite of man's unfaithfulness to God, God has been and continues to be faithful: from Adam and Eve, to Noah, to Abraham, to David, to Job, to Esther, to Mary Magdalene, to Paul, and to us. God spoke these merciful and loving words to Moses: "The Lord, the Lord, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness, keeping steadfast love for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin." (Exodus 34:6-7) Through daily Bible readings the children hear and experience the never-ending love of God for us in Christ Jesus. As these students hear of the Lord's faithfulness to them, they will bear the fruit of faithfulness in their lives. Their faithfulness will show God's love, mercy, and forgiveness to others. Thank you for supporting this ministry to the children of our community.

Trinity Lutheran School is now accepting students for the 2010-2011 school year. Some of our current families have been at Trinity for five generations. Two of these families were featured in a recent article in The Sheboygan Press: "Faithful families: Generations of Jurss and Rodewald families trod steps of Trinity School". In a recent sermon by Rev. Joel Howard, a comment of Pastor Howard's made me think. He mentioned a gift from his wife that he keeps on his desk. Basically it is a memo from God that says; 'Joel, I know what your problems are; and I won't be needing your help with them today'.

I found this very interesting in two ways. First, it is a great reminder to us to put our problems in God's hands. We fret and stress over the small problems in our lives. Give them to God in your prayers, and know that He will be with you; strengthening, guiding and supporting.

The second thought was how God uses us to help answer the prayers of others. So, when Joel turns a problem over to God, God may call on me or you for help. I think of the recent problems of Trinity members, and the ways that help was given. The stabbing of Andrew Voss and the fire that destroyed the home of Mary Niesing are prime examples. The help started with the great outpouring of prayers for this Christian brother and sister and support for their families.

On Sunday, February 14th, there was a letter from the family of Olivia McTrusty. They thanked the people of Trinity for the prayers, love and support shown to their daughter during her long fight with Leukemia. God uses us, our time, talents and treasures to help those in need. I think of how God uses Thrivent Financial for Lutherans also. 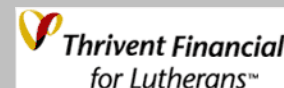

Ah, Sheboygan. Brats and Lutherans, and the question is: are they interchangeable?

Haha, just kidding. My daughter and I, along with the interminably zesty Zeke Bartlett of Mental Llama blog fame, spent the weekend at a theological retreat sponsored by the Higher Things Lutheran youth organization. This isn't your ordinary happy-clappy Christian youth get together. The topics are decidedly doctrinal and challenging, and the kids, generally confirmed youth through high school-- carefully listen. The pastors who lead these sessions are engaging and entertaining, but they definitely don't hold back when it comes to going deeply into the chosen topic of the retreat.

The location of the retreat was Trinity Lutheran (one of them, anyway) in Sheboygan, with its beautiful, restored sanctuary. The people of Trinity are to be congratulated for taking such good care of this church they have inherited. Pastors Mech and Berg can be my pastors, any day.

The chosen topic of the retreat was itself a deep one: the doctrine of Confession and Absolution. Try luring 175 teenagers to something like this. Yeah, just try it!

Yet come they did, and the topic was fascinating. While there was ample time for the kids to hang out together--as well as to watch a Hitchcock movie and to see Comedy Sportz at a nearby restored movie house--the bulk of the time was taken up with worship, breakout sessions on various topics, and longer plenary sessions with two pastors. The highlight of the plenary sessions was a great video of Johnny Cash, late in his life, singing an old Nine Inch Nails tune, HURT. It is worth a look, and was a great setup for the topic of the need for confession, the greater need for absolution--and while we're at it for a nice chat about the lost but returning practice of Private Confession and Absolution.

I found myself often sitting at the back of the auditorium, just looking around at these kids. Yes, there was chatting and joking around, but by and large they listened carefully to what the presenters were saying. It helped a lot that the presenters were both interesting, funny, and also interspersed really great videos into their talks.

Scattered around the auditorium and hallways were quotes from the good Doctor Luther himself, some of them pretty funny; some of them more funny because of where they were placed. And of course, the main speakers were called upon to judge the chocolate chip cookie bakeoff. It sounds like a good gig, but they were pretty sick of cookies by the time the judging ended.

Thanks Trinity! What a great weekend! We will be back next year.
