

ALL SAINTS' DAY

†††

All Saints' Day (November 1 on the Church Year calendar) commemorates all saints of God, known and unknown. Dating back to 609 A.D., the observance of this day has expanded from a commemoration of the martyrs who died for their faith to a commemoration of all saints. It is a festival of the church that exceeds all bounds of race and language and space. As we observe the day, we praise God who has triumphed through the faithful and whose abounding grace we saw in their lives.

The Confessions of the Lutheran Church encourage us to remember the saints such as we are doing today: "It is also taught among us that saints should be kept in remembrance so that our faith may be strengthened when we see what grace they received and how they were sustained in faith. Moreover, their good works are to be an example for us, each of us in his own calling." (*Augsburg Confession*, Article XXI).

The Scripture readings for today move from an emphasis on the saints who have gone before us to those who, living now, seek to live the life God has given through His Son. In the basic New Testament sense, a saint is one "made holy" by the Spirit of God, a part of God's "holy nation." The reading from John's **Revelation** comforts us with the certainty that "God will wipe every tear from their eyes." In the epistle of **I John** we are reminded that all the saints are "children of God" because of the love of God in Jesus Christ. Finally, the beatitudes of **Matthew** chapter 5, paint a picture of the Christian Church on earth as a people made holy through their connection to the Lord Jesus Christ.

The color of the day is white, signifying the purity and righteousness of heaven," through Jesus' blood and merit. Those who have died in the faith of Christ are now enjoying the eternal peace of the presence of Jesus Christ. We who are yet in this world "see through the glass darkly." While we have eternal life, we are still living in a world of sin. While we have Jesus with us each step of life, the tempter also is near. And yet, there is that "mystic, sweet communion with those whose rest is won." A oneness among the "church of earth" and the "church in heaven." This is the joy of All Saints' Day, which gives eternal hope and peace.



Yes. Remembering and honoring the saints is very "Lutheran." God's Word and the Lutheran Confessions teach that remembering and honoring the saints is a great thing to do.



Why is it such a great thing to do?

The Apology of the Augsburg Confession, which explains what Lutherans believe, teaches that we honor the saints for three reasons. Thanksgiving. When we honor the saints, we thank God for "showing (his people) examples of his mercy, revealing his will to save men, and giving teachers and other gifts to the church." (2) Strengthening our faith. When we see how our Lord forgives the saints, we are "encouraged to believe that grace does abound more than sin." (Do you remember when Peter, one of the disciples, denied Jesus three times? Even the Apostles sinned and received forgiveness.) (3) "the imitation, first of their faith and then of their other virtues ..." We pray that God would keep us as strong in the faith as they were!



Parents: Explain to your children that we are not praying to the saints; we are simply honoring them on a special day in the Church Year. Remind them that, when we die, we will be with our Lord in heaven, which is where the saints are right now!

Learn by Heart: The Second Article (LSB p. 322 & 323)

THIS WEEK IN SUNDAY SCHOOL: "A Centurion Converts" is the title for this week's lesson. A faithful and generous centurion named Cornelius has a vision of God's angel telling him to bring Peter to Caesarea. In Joppa, Peter sees a vision of a sheet descending from the sky, filled with all

kinds of animals. The instruction to "kill and eat" confuses Peter, since many of the animals on the sheet are considered unclean. The Spirit tells Peter to go to Caesarea. At Cornelius's home, the Holy Spirit descends on the Gentiles as Peter preaches the Gospel to them. Peter commands the Gentiles to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. **Revelation 7:9-17** ⁹After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude that no one could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed in white robes, with palm branches in their hands, ¹⁰ and crying out with a loud voice, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!" ¹¹And all the angels were standing around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, ¹²saving, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen." ¹³Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, clothed in white robes, and from where have they come?" ¹⁴I said to him, "Sir, you know." And he said to me, "These are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. They have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. ¹⁵"Therefore they are before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple; and he who sits on the throne will shelter them with his presence. ¹⁶They shall hunger no more, neither thirst anymore: the sun shall not strike them, nor any scorching heat. ¹⁷For the Lamb in the midst of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of living water, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

1 John 3:1–3 ¹See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are. The reason why the world does not know us is that it did not know him. ²Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. ³And everyone who thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure.

Matthew 5:1–12 ¹Seeing the crowds, [Jesus] went up on the mountain, and when he sat down, his disciples came to him. ²And he opened his mouth and taught them, saying: ³"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. ⁴"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. ⁵"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. ⁶"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied. ⁷"Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy. ⁸"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God. ⁹"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God. ¹⁰"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. ¹¹"Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. ¹²Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Notes on Today's Service

Treasures from the Church: "Our churches teach that the remembrance of the saints is to be commended in order that we may imitate their faith and good works according to our calling" (Augsburg Confession XXI).

Summary of Readings: "*A great multitude … from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages,*" cry out, "*Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne*" (Rev. 7:9-17). Faith-filled saints from every place and time, with unified voices, eternally magnify the Lamb of God. As His beloved children, we, too, "*shall see him as he is*" (1 John 3:1-3). Joined with the throng of angels and myriad saints, we shall "*serve him day and night in his temple*" (Rev. 7:9-17). In our earthly tension vacillating between saint and sinner, faith and doubt, sacred and profane, we earnestly seek Jesus to calm our fears, comfort our spirits and forgive our sins. The Holy Spirit through faith in Christ propels us forward, fortifying us in Word and Sacrament, to our eternal home. In the midst of our constant struggle as believers, we need to be blessed. And so we are. The poor in spirit, the meek, the hungry, the thirsty, the merciful, the pure and the persecuted are all blessed, and we will most certainly inherit the kingdom of heaven (Matt. 5:1-12).

The Church: "Christ, the Chief Shepherd, has called us out of the world and into His flock (1 Peter 5:2). Wherever one finds the living voice of Christ and those who by the Holy Spirit hear and believe it - both pastor and flock together - there is the church. Lutherans define the church as God's giving and our receiving, that is, Lutherans confess that the church exists where the sinner is being forgiven in the stead and by the command of the Lord Jesus. Christ's redeeming work and the delivery of that work through the preaching of the Gospel leave no doubt for the saints that there is a church or that they belong to it. Christ the Good Shepherd gives; His flock receives. Defining the church as shepherd and sheep (John 10:1-18) denies any claim that a special group within the church is the true church, whether the papacy, the local congregation alone, the clergy alone or even one particular institutional church body, such as the LCMS. The shepherd and the sheep belong together, regardless of time and place in the world. That happens primarily in worship, whether here on earth or there in heaven. In the Church Triumphant in heaven. God and the Lamb gather the great multitude of saints adorned as a bride before her husband; the saints stand before the throne to receive from Him and to praise Him with joyful thanksgiving (Rev. 21:1-7). Even now, before the final day, the church is known on earth in worship, where God gives, and His saints receive and give Him joyful thanks. Therefore, we deny that a group of Christians can be church without the office of preaching (AC V) and we deny that preachers can be church without faithful hearers (AC XXVIII). A congregation might be 'vacant,' but she is never without the preaching office of Christ, even when there is no ordained man to fill it at the moment. The Lord's promise that wherever two or three are gathered in His name, there He is among them (Matt. 18:20), makes clear that at least two are needed in the church: one for delivering and one for receiving the forgiveness offered in Jesus' name." - From "I Believe in One Holy Christian Church,' The Doctrine of the Church", The Lutheran Witness, June 1, 2021, Rev. 

What is "All Saints' Day"?

All Saints' Day is the day during the Church Year that we celebrate, remember and honor all of those who have died with faith in Jesus and are now with Him in heaven.

Why do we celebrate All Saints' Day?

The word "saint" comes from the Latin word *sanctus* which means "holy" or "sacred." Saints are God's holy people. We thank God for the saints who have gone before us because of their great example of faith and God's great mercy in their lives!

Do you have to die to be a saint?

No way! All of God's faithful people are His saints! We were washed clean of our sins at our Baptism and made holy before God. That's what it means when we hear God's Word say: "These are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. They have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb" (Rev. 7:14). Isn't it great to know that it is not what we have done that makes us a saint, but what Jesus has done for us through His death and resurrection? He gives all of this to us through Baptism. He is the one who makes us a saint!



Parents: Talk to your children about those in your own family who have died in the faith. Explain that they are now with Jesus in heaven. Remind them that this is a fulfillment of God's promises at our Baptism.
